FAMILY MATTERS – Of Life in Two Worlds

FAMILY MATTERS follows the traces of a German family that, over generations, continues to cross the Atlantic in both directions. Like Elizabeth and Little Henry who, at the beginning of the 20th century, are forced to leave their beloved New York to return to the old country; the violinist Clara who can only live her passion for music in the America of the suffragettes; the war bride Toni, who courageously follows a G.I. to Nebraska after World War II; and, finally, the student Iris who is trying to find her place in both worlds in the 1980s. Looking back, they all ask the same question: „What if?“

What if they had not gone to America, or back to the old country? If they had not fallen in love? What if they had taken that other road and pursued their dreams a bit more forcefully? FAMILY MATTERS takes ordinary, yet memorable characters out of the yellowed pictures in the photo albums, gives them a voice and places them in their own time. Martina J. Kohl revives the past. She shows that today cannot be understood without the yesterday. And that migration, uprooting and the search for belonging are universal themes.

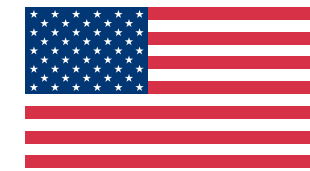

Dr. Habel's teaching is informed by both U.S. Politics and Comparative Politics, including course offerings in public opinion; mass media, digital media, and social media; political communication; and U.S. politics. His publications include *Citizens, Elites, and Social Media: Methodological Challenges and Opportunities in the*

Study of Persuasion and Mobilization, The Oxford Handbook of Electoral Persuasion (2019) (available online) and *News and Information Leadership in the Digital Age*, Information, Communication and Society 22 (2018). He received his PhD from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign.



Martina J. Kohl

is a lecturer, writer and Public Diplomacy specialist. She is author of the fictional memoir "FAMILY MATTERS - Of Life in Two Worlds"

(English & German ed., PalmArtPress Berlin 2023). For three decades she worked in the Public Affairs Section of the U.S. Embassy, first in Bonn, then Berlin. She coordinated the Embassy's Germany-wide expert speaker program, was responsible for teacher outreach and curriculum development and established the U.S. Embassy Literature Series. She has been teaching regularly in the American Studies program at Humboldt Universität Berlin for 25 years. As former long-time editor of the American Studies Journal (AS), now NASJ), she also taught in the Journalism program at HMKW Berlin, at the Obama Institute at Johannes-Gutenberg Universität Mainz and at Georg-August-Universität Göttingen. The U.S. Elections 2024

On November 5 of this year, U.S. citizens will go to the polls to elect a President and their members of Congress, and to choose candidates for state and local offices. Many believe that 2024 will be one of our most consequential elections. The national campaigns are likely to center on issues such as the economy, immigration, the overturning of Roe v. Wade and abortion access, foreign affairs including the war in Ukraine and the conflict in Gaza, climate, diversity in the U.S including LGBTQ policies, healthcare and Social Security, issues affecting Generation Z--not to forget former President Trump's legal woes or President Biden's age. This talk will provide insight into the campaigns, public opinion polling, party platforms, and the prospects for governance. The talk will also provide attendees with the tools to understand not only the 2024 elections, but future elections, as well as the dynamics of U.S. politics more generally.
